

•Production of varying weights, from 60 to 150 knots per square inch.





Hand-Woven

- Geometric designs are best suited for this fabrication, as they are woven on vertical and horizontal planes.

Cut Pile




Loop Pile



Flat-Woven

Natural Dyes

Natural dyes are derived from herbs, plants and vegetables such as madder root, pomegranate peel, safflower, walnut shells and indigo. They can be matched to any color and form beautiful, organic gradations due to the unprocessed quality of the pigment. All types of yarn will absorb dyes in their own unique way, creating natural color variations across each dye lot.

Unsorted Tibetan Wool

Unsorted wool is the name given to the material before it's carded – where black, brown and white fibers are each sorted and cleaned. Colors will vary in shade and gradation, creating an overall natural appearance.

Undyed Tibetan Wool

As the name describes, undyed wool maintains the natural colors of the fiber. It can still be sorted, carded and spun into a selected color, but it will also take on a subtle tone variation due to the natural shades found in each color.

Tibetan Wool

Tibetan wool is a soft, yet durable, yarn locally sourced from the Himalayas. This versatile material can range from 60 knots for a heavy, woven look to 150 knots for more intricate designs.

Tencel

“Tencel” is the brand name for a fiber called Lyocell. Derived from wood pulp and sourced from sustainably-grown forests, the production process is a closed-loop system in which the chemicals used to produce this yarn are recycled. The fiber is soft and smooth, making it suitable as a silk alternative. It is best used for residential or low-traffic areas and can be dyed in any color.

Sustainable Options

All yarns here can be combined and dyed to match any color. Made-to-order in a wide range of shapes and sizes – from area rugs to wall-to-wall carpeting – each yarn is sourced locally.

Silk

Silk is one of the most widely-known fibers, given its delicate and luxurious appearance – best suited for residential or low-traffic areas. It can be blended with other yarns, depending on application or budget. Because of its more fragile nature, silk needs special care to help maintain its lavish look and feel.

Cactus

Cactus is similar to sisal in texture and strength, making it suitable for medium to high traffic areas, but has a softer feel. This yarn can be hand-knotted or flat-woven, depending on the application, and can be used in its natural color or dyed to another hue.
